Purpose of Activity/Assignment: To support the State Department for Social Protection in the participatory development of Disability Inclusive and Gender-Responsive care and support systems for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) across the life cycle.

Background

While Kenya has made progress in promoting disability inclusion through policy and legal frameworks, significant challenges persist in education, healthcare, employment, and in social attitudes coupled with gender inequities. Effective implementation, awareness campaigns, and comprehensive support systems are essential to address these challenges and create a more inclusive society where individuals with disabilities can fully participate and contribute to the nation's development. Further investment and collaboration between government, organizations of and for persons with disabilities (OPWDs), civil society organizations, and international organizations are crucial to achieving meaningful and lasting change in disability inclusion in Kenya.

Individuals with disabilities face a myriad of challenges ranging from limited access to healthcare, education, and employment opportunities and to social stigma and exclusion. In this context, the need for community care and support emerges as an imperative force, bridging the gap between adversity and empowerment. The provision of community-based care and support not only addresses the immediate needs of individuals with disabilities but also fosters a more inclusive society where everyone, regardless of their abilities, can thrive and contribute to the nation's progress.

Under the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) PWDs have the right to live independently in the community and states must ensure access of the support they require to do so. However, around the world, at least 150 million persons with higher support needs do not receive any publicly funded disability support required for basic participation in their communities.

In most Low-and Middle-Income Countries (LMICs), PWDs rely on unpaid care work from families and communities, particularly women and girls and receive very little or no publicly funded formal support except for placement in segregated settings in some regions. This status quo is increasingly challenged by the impact of aging populations, increased demand of women in the labour market, urbanization, growing awareness of PWDs about their right to autonomy, and demand for gender equality. While the expansion of social protection across LMICs as well as the CRPD and the care economy momentum create an opportunity for a new model to emerge, there is a lack of clarity among stakeholders about the actual needs and demands of the diversity of PWDs for community-based support and care, as well as benchmark and models for context relevant policy framework, system development, service delivery and financing.

In Kenya, the Government is committed to increasing financing to the National Safety Net to 1.7 percent of its GDP to scale up coverage of vulnerable groups, develop integrated package services and promote inclusion of PWDs among others. Different initiatives and programs exist, including the Persons with Severe Disabilities-Cash Transfer (PWSD-CT), in-kind support (e.g., assistive devices for disability card holders), services (e.g., peer support groups – Users and Survivors of Psychiatry in Kenya; circle of support – Kenya Association of the Intellectually Handicap or personal assistance for civil servants with disabilities), but there are still significant gaps in coverage, inclusiveness, and adequacy despite existing efforts.

The Persons with Disabilities (Repeal) Bill approved by the Cabinet in August 2018 includes provisions on social assistance for persons with severe or multiple disabilities who require constant medical care or other long term support services.

The Directorate of Social Development is interested to work on exploring policy options to develop community care and support systems based, in part, on the results of the support need survey carried out in 2022. The process of development of the report was highly participatory with strong engagement of Organizations for Persons with

Disabilities (OPD) which lay the ground for further work on developing a road map on how Kenya could develop care and support systems for PWDs across the life cycle. UNICEF has also been supporting extensive assessment of alternative care system for children with disabilities, and piloted inclusive universal benefit as well as cash plus intervention for children with disabilities in Mombasa County. There is also an ongoing reform of the disability assessment and determination mechanism which is crucial for care and support systems. In addition, the International Disability and Development Consortium (IDDC) members such as Sight Savers, Christian Blind Mission (CBM) and Humanitarian Inclusion (HI) have significant programs across the country and carried out several relevant studies in recent years such as budget analysis and cost of disability studies.

Building on the joint work initiated prior to Global Disability Summit (GDS) of 2022 and the conceptual and normative framework proposed by OHCHR in its recent report to the Human Rights Council (A/HRC/52/52), this project seeks to contribute to change by clarifying the demand from an OPDs' perspective, developing an assessment tool to improve concrete understanding of the normative framework and its implication at country level and to support elaboration of costed policy scenarios exploring viable pathways for progressive development of community support and care systems in Kenya.

This project directly contributes to UNICEF's collective efforts to strengthen work on the care and support agenda and inclusive social protection under Goal Area 5 as well as the cross-sectoral strategic priority 3 of the UNICEF Disability Inclusion Policy and Strategy (DIPAS). It is also a component of the broader cooperation with OHCHR, IDA, IDDC and CBM on community care and support system for PWDs in community 2030 partnership.

Key tasks and deliverables

The key tasks for this consultancy include.

i) Technical support to Workshop Series

- Working closely with IDA and OPDs, hold a total of six workshops at the onset, middle, and end of the
 process, with OPDs and families to review existing systems, clarify the type of care and support systems
 those organizations want and how they would address this tension between the need for better and more
 support while addressing gender inequalities in provision and use of care and support.
- Working closely with the State Department for Social Protection (Directorate of Social Development and National Council of Persons with Disabilities), hold workshops at the onset, middle, and end of the process, with government and then multi-stakeholders, to clarify the demand and supply issues in relation to care and support system(s) in Kenya.

Deliverable: A summary brief detailing the collective key asks of the diversity of disability groups for children, working-age adults, and older PWDs.

ii) Carry out National Desk Review and Data Collection:

- Data collection complementing and feeding into multi-stakeholders' consultation. This will include in depth review of existing reports and data collection on missing elements related to social protection systems, care systems, Universal Health Coverage, rehabilitation and assistive technology, national public expenditures on disability inclusion, disability assessment and determination mechanisms, national social registries and information system, housing and transport as well as national and local coordination mechanism and civil society provision of support services, among others. Key documents to be referenced include: The 2021 social protection inclusive assessment by ILO-UNICEF, the disability budget analysis, the support needs survey (2022), the LCD disability related cost report, and 2023 UNPRPD Situation Analysis, among others.

Deliverable: A brief report on the key support needs and care services

iii) Costed policy scenarios.

- Submit a final report with recommendations and scenarios for development of developing Disability Inclusive, Gender Responsive Community Support and Care Systems
- Include 2-3 human interest stories for children with disabilities and their caregivers
- Include also a final child with disabilities infographic drawn from the Support Needs Assessment report and 2021 Time use report from KNBS.
